Thank you all it was very touching, congratulation to those who received awards we are here to celebrate for those recipients. Saving people (Bravery award) serving people (Service award), the words are clear and touching. For the recipients. volunteering and serving others acknowledges who you are, for thinking of others.

Just hearing what you are getting an award for touches the hearts of many people, your fellow men, we are proud of you, it is humbling and touching.

Many functions would not go forward without the volunteers. I thank you very much for your assistance to your community in every aspect in providing volunteerism.

The firefighters, thank you for your hard, never ending work. I want you to know that you are very worthy. You're help that you have brought forward in challenging times, you are thanked and we are proud of you. You do what we are unable to do. Myself

and the residents of Rankin Inlet thank you and your families for their support when you put yourselves at risk in protecting others. The search and rescue as well worked in hard and heavy conditions. When there is a search you put all your work in assisting. If we were to think about how many have you rescued? Many are with us today thanks to the searchers. Thank you very much. This goes to those who are no longer with us as well.

that you will never ever be forgotten, Charlie. We love you. We celebrate with you and are very proud of you.

May you all be blessed, let us have tea and snacks and be merry together. I am very proud of you all along with the residents of Rankin Inlet as you are being recognized. We are here because of you and are very proud of this. We thank you.
